ST. VALENTINE'S DAY & THE FORTY DAYS OF LENT

e get to celebrate a neat, perhaps odd, confluence of dates this year. Ash Wednesday and St. Valentine's Day are the same day this year. It has happened before and will happen again. And it happens with some other dates. Easter and Tax Day, Easter and April Fool's. Easter and the opening day of baseball season. Good Friday and the Annunciation of our Lord. That last one may be a little more obscure, which is okay. You can ask me about it sometime.

It is thought that St. Valentine was put to death on Feb. 14th. And it is the custom that the commemoration of a saint occurs on their 'heavenly birthday', dying around the year 270 AD. St. Valentine was a

Christian priest and a medical doctor. He was accustomed to caring for body and soul. But he lived and worked during a time of persecution by the Roman empire. It is thought that on the day of his execution, having heard that the daughter of his jailer was grieving the thought of his death because she had come to love and appreciate Valentine, Valentine wrote her words of encouragement from Scripture. And the note was supposedly written on a torn piece of paper in the form of a heart. (And from this custom eventually Joyce C. Hall would create a greeting card empire in his adopted hometown of Kansas City MO.)

On the day of hearts and love and candy and so many other things, some of us spend Tuesday getting the grease out of our house (Mardi Gras = Greasy Tuesday), contemplating what sacrifices we'll make these next forty days, preparing to make a peni-

tential journey, and preparing to look both inward and outward while receiving the incomparable mercy of God the Lord.

Lent is a holy time. (Again, if you call me Pastor Obvious I won't disagree.) Lent is a time set apart. It has some similarities to Advent, which is also a time to get ready. Advent and Lent help us prepare for joyous festivals- Christmas and Easter. We prepare by spending time focusing on the necessity of things. We needed a Savior, and that is precisely who was in the manger. And the time for salvation arrives, as Jesus Christ is crucified for our forgiveness and is raised for our justification.

Lent may be a time for self-denial. We recall all the things that were taken away from Jesus, namely dignity and respect, and perhaps we learn to live with a little more simplicity and discipline.

Lent can also be a time for <u>caritas</u>. Perhaps you see in that Latin word our word 'charity'. Charity is love. Christians live as mirrors, reflecting the love we receive from the Lord, shining it out to the people around us. Lent is a time for **(Continued next page)**

Alms? These are the physical and monetary gifts that are given to those in need. How do we do this? A simple explanation is that at lunchtime, you deny yourself the combo meal and opt for a sandwich and a drink. You keep track of the money you save and when Lent is completed you give that money to a charitable organization, a service agency, food bank, social service organization, or a person in need. That's an act of love, a way to put your self-denial to use for someone else.

We'll have extra time for worship, prayer, and meditation. Ash Wednesday begins with worship at 7pm, with the Imposition of Ashes and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Each following Wednesday's service will also begin at 7pm. Stay tuned for the theme of those Wednesday services as that is still being worked on.

Worship will look a little different than it does in Epiphany or Easter. Penitential purple will be seen. We will put away the Church's Alleluia for a time. The hymn of praise will be silent. We won't like it. But we'll also know that this is just for a time, and that times don't always last. It is not always Lent. But for a while it will be. And we'll welcome it for the opportunities we are given. And we'll mark the time until the great Day of Resurrection!

WHAT IS GOD ASKING OF US?

Corinthians 7:29-31, 35 - This is what I mean, brothers: the appointed time has grown very short. From now on, let those who have wives live as though they had none, and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no goods, and

those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away. I want you to be free from anxieties. The unmarried man is anxious about the things of the Lord, how to please the Lord. But the married man is anxious about worldly things, how to please his wife, and his interests are divided. And the unmarried or betrothed woman is anxious about the things of the Lord, how to be holy in body and spirit. But the married woman is anxious about worldly things, how to please her husband. I say this for your own benefit, not to lay any restraint upon you, but to promote good order and to secure your undivided devotion to the Lord.

Have you ever played that game where you imagine what three things you would grab if your house was on fire? It forces you to focus on what's really important. No time to deal with the dirty dishes—I need to grab the baby pictures. We can replace the plates, but I want Grandma's casserole dish. And for goodness' sake, take the dog!

It's harder to play that game on a daily basis—to sort through your mountain of errands, concerns, and busywork to figure out what truly matters, what is the one thing God wants me to be doing today. And yet, that's part of our mandate as Christians, isn't it? Figuring out what Jesus wants us of us, so our one precious life here on earth gets used for His glory as effectively as possible.

I think Jesus must have done much the same thing, given the fact that He would only be with us on earth for thirty-some years. That's a really short time to do all He wanted to do—to teach, to preach, to heal, to convert, and best of all, to save us from the power of evil through His own death and resurrection. Such an urgent mission didn't leave Him time for a lot of extras; obviously He never married or had children, and He arranged His life so that He could be as free as possible to do what God wanted from Him.

What, then, is God asking from us? That's going to be between each of us and the Holy Spirit to figure out. In my case, it involves being married, raising a son, and caring for a refugee church, as well as writing. In your case, what? Whatever it is, God will guide you to it. And you can do it with gladness, knowing that it helps more and more people to hear about Jesus—because He is the One who matters most of all.

WE PRAY. Dear Savior, set my heart and my eyes on You, so that I do the really important things—the ones that make a difference for You and Your people. Amen.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. How do you prioritize things in your life?
- 2. Paul highlights the differences between those who are married and those who are single. Why do you think he points to that distinction?
- 3. Do you try to begin each day with a gameplan, so to speak, in respect to your Christian life and how you will spend your time?

OPPORTUNITIES

What An Opportunity! "Serve the LORD with gladness!" (Psalm 100:2a)

Have you had a unique opportunity in your life? Perhaps you have been blessed to attend college, to advance in your job, to travel to a special part of the world on a mission trip, or to use your skills and passion to help people in your community. Opportunity is defined as "a favorable juncture of circumstances," "an occasion or situation which makes it possible to do something, or the possibility of

doing something" (Cambridge English Dictionary and Mirriam-Webster.com Dictionary 2018).

Whatever opportunities you have enjoyed, today there is an opportunity for each of us. That opportunity or "possibility of doing something" is Lent! Lent is an opportunity. Lent is a favorable juncture of time where we are given the gift of 40 days to prepare for Easter. This opportunity begins on Ash Wednesday. For 40 weekdays, we pause, remember, and contemplate what God has done and continues to do for us. So, what might be your "opportunity" this Lenten season?

Lent may mean attending Lenten services where we focus on repentance. When we fully repent, God graciously forgives our sins and releases us from the guilt and sorrow our sins cause us. Knowing God forgives our sins for Jesus' sake, we are filled with joy and thanksgiving that leads us to abundant praise and worship for our great God.

Lent may also mean giving up something. Fasting is one such way to do this. In Matthew 6:16–18, Jesus talks about the proper way to fast. For some, giving up a type of food or other item for the Lenten season is a daily and constant reminder for them of Jesus' total sacrifice for us when He gave up His life on the cross to rescue us from sin and eternal death.

But instead of giving up something for Lent, this season can also be an opportunity for each of us to also consider what we can add to our lives that is good. A good addition might be to write notes (40 of them for each day in the Lenten season) to thank people in your life or tell them you are thinking of them and praying for them that day. Another good addition might mean reading a different psalm each day of Lent as your daily prayer. The Lenten season can be an opportunity to rise and shine 15 minutes early and spend the time in God's presence or even give up a 30- minute television show to add more time in His Word. Or motivated by Christ's own acts of kindness and love, you might wish to do an act of kindness for another person.

Another something we can add during Lent might be to find items in your home, maybe even 40 of them, to give to a service organization in your community that can give them to help those in need. Or perhaps you could encourage members of your family to share some "out of the normal" nice things with one another. For example, instead of just saying "Thank you" or "Good job," take the opportunity to tell your spouse, "I love how you help with the kids." Or tell your kids, "I love how you work hard on your homework," or "I love how you make others feel they are special."

The Lenten season can be a new opportunity for you, "an occasion to do something" memorable and meaningful. Whether you choose to give up something or choose to add something good, spend time in prayer and thanksgiving as the joyous celebration of Jesus' resurrection approaches. Ask the Holy Spirit to use your Lenten "opportunity" to prepare your heart for Easter in a way that is meaningful and that deepens your relationship with God. Enjoy your opportunity this Lenten season!

Prayer: Dear God, may we always, and in every opportunity, be Your willing servants. In Jesus' name. Amen.

CREATE SOME RIPPLES: INVITE SOMEONE



When was the last time you brought someone to church? According to Google, 70 to 85 percent of people interviewed said that they started coming to church because of a friend or a relative asked them. Take a moment to think... who do you know that isn't going to church at the present time? It could be a friend, a family member, or even a neighbor. Let them know what time you will pick them up. Studies show that picking someone up will give

extra encouragement for someone who has not quite made up their mind. You can invite someone, you don't even know... like the lady standing behind you in line at the grocery store.

Certainly, Jesus did not know his disciples before asking them to "follow me." According to the Church Trainer Group, John the Baptist brought disciples John and Andrew, introducing them to the "Lamb of God". Andrew brought Peter; Jesus invited Phillip; Phillip invited Nathanael; John invited his brother James. (John 1:35-51) These historical invites have spread the Word of Jesus globally. That Word continues to resonate today.

This early networking demonstrates how one invite can create ripples that continue touch lives, bringing others to Jesus' side. An invite to church does not cost a cent. It just might make a world of difference to someone looking for their way back to Jesus' side or finding him for the first time.

CHURCH STATS (2023)

Last year seven different pastors graced Our Redeemer with their leadership: Rev. Ray Rogers, Rev. Doug Meilander, Rev. Peter Mueller, Rev. Michael Thress, Rev. Steve Bocklage, Rev.
