

STUCK IN THE MIDDLE ...

hen you receive this newsletter, we will still be in the season of Lent. It is good to have this season last as long as it does because we get the opportunity to learn some patience. We are given the time to absorb the richness and beauty of the Lenten season. There is no beauty in our sinful wanderings that lead us away from God, from fellowship with one another, and from fellowship with the Lord's church. The Lenten season needs the time that it has. Often we need to realize how sharply our words have hurt someone else, how deeply an action of ours wounded someone else. We blithely flit away after saying words of judgment or hostility and then when we find out that the other person feels hurt, we criticize them for being too thin-skinned. It is not our place to judge the thickness of someone else's protective layer. Maybe their skin has been rubbed down by cruelty and callousness until all that is left to protect them is phyllo-dough thick?

And maybe it is not just another person we have judged or wounded... perhaps we have wounded the Lord and His Church. Maybe we have judged the Lord for not doing what we wanted when we wanted Him to do it? Perhaps we have judged the Lord for not bending to our ideas and seeing how good and perfect our ways are?

Lent gives us time to see that the Lord Jesus comes to us to take the punishment for our cruelty to God and others and faithlessness to the Lord's Word. We have time to con-

template what our Lord endured on our behalf and how we are the recipients of unending love and grace.

Lent began in mid- February and runs throughout March. Palm Sunday is March 24th, beginning the great Holy Week. There is no other week like it.

Palm Sunday is when palm branches were cut and laid across the rutted road with cloaks placed on top of them. This made a level road for King Jesus to enter Jerusalem. And while Jesus was riding that donkey, palm branches were waved victoriously to shouts of Hosanna! We'll have church that morning at 10 a.m., beginning the service with the reading of the Palm Sunday Gospel and including the celebration of the Lord's Supper in the service. Bible class will take place at 8:45, perhaps with a deeper exploration of the events of that week.

Maundy Thursday worship will be held at 7p.m. on the 28th. This is the night of the foot washing, of the command/mandate to 'love one another as I have loved you.' It is also the night of the *(next page)*

Our service will conclude with the stripping of the altar. This is designed to mirror the humiliation of our Lord Jesus. In His betrayal, arrest, and beatings Jesus was humiliated. Our lovely chancel area, with lovely candelabra and appointments and vessels, will be made bare. Our lovely things will be taken away.

Every day this week is a high day, Good Friday may rise above them all. This is the day our Lord died, truly being the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. To the world this is loss; for the believer this is victory and release. What appeared to Satan and Death as triumph with Jesus on the cross was actually a dagger to their heart. Our Good Friday Tenebrae Vespers service will be at 7p.m. on March 29th.

Easter, the Day of Resurrection, is March 31st. Festival worship will be at 10am and a fun breakfast will be held at 9a.m. You can find details about that elsewhere in this newsletter.

But this is certainly the Week of weeks. We look forward to this time, giving thanks to God for all the gifts He sends our way, giving thanks for not rejecting us but including us in His righteous plan of salvation. I look forward to worshiping the Lord and celebrating with you in our services.

Education News

You may want an update or two regarding some of the opportunities for learning we have in our congregation. First of all, we hold Bible class every Sunday morning at 8:45 a.m.. At this time we are studying the lessons from Isaiah that we will hear in our worship services this year. I've found this to be an interesting study, discovering the connections to the Gospel lessons and seeing the fulfillment of these prophecies. At present we record the videos to our YouTube channel and a link is sent out either Sunday afternoon or on Monday.

FINDING LIGHT, HOPE AND CONTENTMENT



This Lenten Devotion was written by Dr. Kari Vo.

As [Jesus] passed by, He saw a man blind from birth. And His disciples asked Him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God might be displayed in him. We must work the works of Him who sent Me while it is day; night is

coming, when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the Light of the world." (John 9:1-5)

Have you ever had somebody judge you for a misfortune that happened to you? "God must have cursed you," they said. "You did something wrong."

That's a horrible thing to hear when you're already suffering. And maybe you begin to wonder: What if they're right?

But Jesus makes it clear that this is wrong. People suffer for many reasons, most of them have nothing to do with punishment. God calls us to react to suffering like Jesus does—with kindness and mercy. Look at the effect His gentle care had on the man! Within hours the man has been condemned by the religious leaders and denied by his parents. And yet when Jesus finds him later, the man is not complaining. He learns who Jesus is—the One God sent to be our Savior—and he worships Him. As long as he has Jesus, he is content.

We too can find hope, light, and contentment in Jesus. He has given His own life for us, that we might live in the light of His resurrection forever. How could He possibly not help us in our suffering now with all mercy, love, and gentleness? **WE PRAY**: Savior, be the light in my darkest times. Amen.

A Circle of Light Devotion: "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? (Ps. 27:1)."

The trip had been long--almost 550 miles round-trip for a brief meeting. Car trouble, a large repair bill, and an unexpected stay in a strange town had added to the stress. But traveling alone was the hardest part. Recently widowed, she was not yet accustomed to the miles of quiet. She missed the warm and friendly chat-

ter that had been a part of so many trips in the past. Miles sped by and darkness came. "Thank You, God, for getting me this far. Please take me safely home tonight," she prayed. Suddenly, coming over a small hill she saw a breathtaking sight! On the prairie was a gigantic circle of lights-lights of homes and farms, irrigation wells and feedlots, radio towers and small towns. It reminded her of John 8:12, Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the

light of life." As she drove on, a new and comforting thought entered her mind. "That is a picture of my life. It reminds me of all the times that God has been with me in the past." She thought of the parents who had lived the Christian faith they taught her, the teachers and friends who had challenged her, and the loving husband who had encouraged and supported her. As her eyes scanned the horizon, each light brought another memory. Some brought a smile; others brought pain; but through them all echoed Jesus' promise, "I am with you always" (Matt. 28:20). The lights of her own small town grew brighter. Soon she would be safely home, and for that she would thank God again. She also prayed that she would remember the circle of lights and Jesus' promise. Personal Challenge: Choose a light to symbolize God's presence in your life: the welcoming brightness of your own porch light, the eternal light in your church, the lighted digital dial of your alarm clock. Each time you see that light, thank God that He is with you, surrounding you with His light and love.

Prayer: Thank You, Lord, for traveling each step of life with me. Thank You for being the Light that shines through every joy and every sorrow. Forgive me when my faith flickers and grows dim. Help me to remember that Your love for me is always strong and bright. In Jesus' name. Amen.
