We come burdened by sins, by the failures of our day, by the shame of falling to temptation one more time. And those sins are forgiven by Jesus. The Lord gives us a fresh start. And that also happens each day. Every day is an opportunity for us to live in our baptismal grace. Each day is an opportunity to rejoice that the Lord's mercies are new every morning.

## SEPTEMBER — PENTECOST

The Gospel for this period begins with Jesus being asked to drive out a demon by a Phoenician woman who trusted Him. He was impressed with her faith in Him and healed the girl. Jesus work to drive out demons continued. Jesus teaches His disciples but they wanted to be favored and were reminded that their job was to serve, not be served.

This period closes with the teaching about the acceptance of differing efforts that are in His Name. The remark was; "Whoever is not against us is for us."

The Old Testament scripture includes the words of prophesy regarding the miracles of Jesus. Isaiah 50 outlines Israel's sins and the coming *Servant* who will be rejected and beaten. In Jeremiah we learn of a plot against him like that against Jesus.

Much of the OT is about Israel fleeing through the wilderness and their many complaints. God had to provide manna, quail, and water for them under Moses leadership.

The Epistle lessons begin with James reminding the church not to show favoritism in their ministry since all are equally in need of salvation. James goes on with the warning we must 'tame the tongue' since many sins come from the spoken word. He goes on to tell us that true wisdom comes from God.

Finally James cautions the wealthy not to lord it over the others or servants. We are all under the hand of God in the same manner and so should love others.

The Psalms are words of worship; some beginning with "Praise the Lord". Others focus on worship and praise for the Lord. Psalm 104 ends this period with a description of God's creation and all living things. We are urged to reflect on this and rely on the Lord. —Arlen Bessel (Archived from September 2022)



# SHOULDERS FOR BURDENS

The Levites carried the ark of God with the poles on their shoulders." 1 Chronicles 15:15

In an age that has perfected mechanical devices of all kinds for carrying loads, we are apt to forget the homely wisdom of the Yiddish prov-

erb: God gave burdens, also shoulders. The Levites counted it an honor and a privilege to carry the ark of the covenant upon their shoulders.

The shoulders of God's people of old were also for bearing suffering, as the psalmist declared: "Yet for Your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered" (Psalm 44:22). In the New Testament God's people are also encouraged to bear sufferings for Christ's sake, yes, to find joy in being exposed to "the painful trial" through which they are participating in the sufferings of Christ (1 Peter 4:12-13).

Discipleship under Jesus is a burden which is not to be escaped. To be mocked, abused, and rejected because we walk with our Lord is to share Christ's suffering. None of this is easy, but it is all necessary. For this God has given us the shoulders of faith -- of faith in Christ's sufferings for us. Our faith is lifted by the promise: "My yoke is easy, and My burden is light" (Matthew 11:30).

God's grace is sufficient for us today, as it has always been for those chosen by him to extend His Word and work into the world. PRAYER: Lord, give us shoulders equal to Your burdens. Amen.

In the Word: You turned my wailing into dancing; you removed my sackcloth and clothed me with joy, that my heart may sing to you and not be silent (Psalm 30:11–12a).

lowing a particular diet pill. Advertisers want to convince us to buy the product capable of making such a difference in our lives.

The Bible says we — all of us — were born into sin. Before Baptism, before Spirit-given faith in Jesus Christ, we were dead in our sins with no hope of change. After Baptism, after Spirit-given faith in Jesus Christ, we became alive in Him. After Him and in Him, we've changed. We know God loves us. We know Jesus won our salvation. # Woolly Bear, Woolly Bear What Will Winter Wear?



As the clock ticks down towards fall, the fearless wooly bear caterpillars stop their munching and inch across highways as vehicles blow by. Some will actually make it across roadways to find a spot to hide under debris, rocks, or bark where they will wait out the winter.

Some say that the nearly two inch bristly reddish brown and black striped caterpillar can predict how much cold, and ice will come with the winter winds. The banded woolly worm, as it is sometimes called, hatches from eggs

laid by the Isabella Tiger Moth. The yellowish adult moth lays a few dozen small white pearly looking eggs on old posts or trees in late spring and summer. After hatching the small hairless larvae busily munch on nettle, dandelion, clover, sorrel, and other common weeds. As the larvae mature, the woolly bear grows, and distinct hairy bands develop.

It is the number and the color of the hairy black and reddish-brown bands that are said to predict whether winter will prove mild or not. There is no definitive scientific evidence that guarantees the accuracy of predicting weather with wooly bears. The theory behind this weather prediction goes something like this. If the black stripes on either end of the critter are longer than the middle reddish stripe winter will be long and cold. A wide center reddish or brown band indicates that winter will be mild.

So ... based on a small sample of woolly bears that have come across my path recently I will take a stab at forecasting a winter weather outlook. Some had wide black bands, and some had wide reddish-brown bands. In fact, they all looked different. So which ones are right? I am going to go out on a limb and say that winter will be mild ... or not. My guess is that the woolly bear caterpillar is probably as accurate as predicting winter as Punxsutawney Phil is at predicting how many weeks of winter are left on Groundhog Day.

The Farmer's Almanac reports that some people take to reading the woolly bear to extremes. Apparently there are 13 segments on a typical banded wooly bear. Some believe that each band represents a week of winter. Orange and brown segments are said to predict the mild weeks, and the black ones forecast bad weather weeks.

The almanac also reports that some weather sleuths look at the thickness of the wooly bear hair. Thick fuzzy worms indicate a cold, snowy winter and a not so hairy worm means a milder one. If you think that confuses the issue there are others who look at the direction the wooly bear is traveling for weather forecasting. If the caterpillar heads north, it will prove to be a mild winter. A crawl towards south and it is time to break out the shovels and rock salt.

The modern folklore of predicting wintry weather by following the wooly bear began in 1948 with Dr. C.H. Curran, curator of insects at the American Museum of Natural History in New York City after a trip to Bear Mountain State Park to look at the woolly bears. Curran collected as many caterpillars as he could in a day. He determined the number of reddish-brown segments and hazarded a forecast with a reporter friend at the New York Herald Tribune. Curran's experimentation continued for the next eight years as he worked to prove scientifically the folklore weather rule that had been passed on through generations around Bear Mountain.

When wooly bears begin to seek out hiding spaces for the winter, it is certain that fall is right around the corner and winter will soon follow. The wooly bear does not care. Burrowed down in a hidden spot, its body secretes a substance to help it survive the winter freeze. When warm weather arrives the caterpillar begins a munching frenzy before spinning and encasing itself in a chrysalis. A short time later a dull yellow and furry tiger moth with small black spots emerges. After a brief period of mating and laying eggs the moth's life cycle will end. And it the end, fall will give way to winter ... so predicts the wooly bear.


