This topic of boundaries is very subjective. You may draw a line in a place I wouldn't, and vice versa. How do we determine when we should blur a boundary line? Since there is no textbook for this sort of thing, our operating rule is our Christian faith and the love of God is our guide. What is the faithful thing? What is the loving action? What best serves my neighbor? And then we go from there.



Stay tuned- I have been in touch with our LCMS Foundation the last several months. This group handles estate planning, charitable giving, and some decisions that pertain to the latter years of our life. The LCMS Foundation is a

national organization with regional representatives that help people make plans that are consistent with their faith, plans for proper stewardship of the Lord's blessings we have re-

### HOLDING MONEY LIGHTLY

This Daily Devotion was written by Dr. Kari Vo

Ecclesiastes 5:10-11, 13-15a, 16 - He who loves money will not be satisfied with money, nor he who loves wealth with his income; this also is

vanity. When goods increase, they increase who eat them, and what advantage has their owner but to see them with his eyes? ... There is a grievous evil that I have seen under the sun: riches were kept by their owner to his hurt, and those riches were lost in a bad venture. And he is father of a son, but he has nothing in his hand. As he came from his mother's womb he shall go again, naked as he came .... This also is a grievous evil: just as he came, so shall he go, and what gain is there to him who toils for the wind?

If anyone understood money, it was King Solomon—the author of this passage. He was known far and wide as a rich man—in his day, they said, "the king made silver as common in Jerusalem as stone" (1 Kings 10:27a).

And yet he is not happy. He points out that, as money increases, more and more people show up to get their share of it; and one bad decision means a man can leave nothing to his heirs. He can't take even a penny with him when he dies. So what is the point of heaping up money?

Maybe this is why Jesus taught us to pray, "Give us this day our daily bread" (Matthew 6:11) —that is, just enough of what we need right now, but not so much that we pile it up for the future and begin to put our faith and trust in it. If God provides for us daily, then we learn to trust and hope in God for all the good things we need in life

But this is hard for us, because we prefer to trust in things we can see and handle and understand. God is invisible, and we cannot control Him—how then shall we trust in Him to give us what we need?

God knows that this is hard for us, and that is one reason He came into our world as the Man Jesus.

Through the Gospels, we can see God in action and get to know Him. We can see Jesus caring for the sick and the poor, welcoming the outcasts, challenging those who oppressed others, comforting those who grieved, forgiving the guilty and ashamed. We start to see how trustworthy He is—how He never breaks a promise, how His heart runs to help people in trouble, even if it's their own fault. And of course we see the greatest thing He did for us, by giving Himself into death for our sake and then rising again, so that we could become children of God.

Someone who loves us that much is someone we can trust without holding back. And because He lives forever, He will always be there to help us when we are in need. With a Savior like this, we can hold our money lightly—as a tool, not a god. We know our real safety is in Jesus, not money.

### MORE NEWS & NOTES — BUSY FALL AT ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN



**ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN** — Our Redeemer Lutheran Church and Faith Lutheran Church members travelled to Orphan Grain Train to help roll and prepare hygiene packages for those who were left in the devastation of Hurricane Helene.

Meeting humanitarian needs also includes disaster recovery. Hurricane Helene did massive damage in Ashville, North Carolina. Since Ashville is in the Southeastern District, we are following the lead of their Disaster Recovery team with boots on the ground there. They put out a call for 18,000 hygiene kits and 12,000 house cleaning kits and selected other items.

Mid-Atlantic Branch immediately started assembling materials. On October 9<sup>th</sup> we prayed before we began rolling hygiene kits. The hygiene kit components include towels, wash clothes, soap, shampoo, hand sanitizer, toothbrushes, toothpaste, comb, clippers, bandages, all inside a gallon bag to protect them. The volunteers from many churches are averaging about 1,400 kits a day and will have completed 5,500 kits (30% of their request to all donors) by October 30. We will keep you informed of opportunities to volunteer assistance.

Then a 53-foot truck will pick them up for delivery to Ashville. The same truck will be collecting food items and cleaning kits from the branch in Maryland. Some other requested supplies will also be shipped. Everything will be boxed and labeled so that the workers on the ground can manage the aid efficiently.

Mid-Atlantic Branch plans on making another shipment in mid-November which will probably focus on house cleaning kits for Helene and Milton to be delivered as requested. Altogether we will have spent over \$40,000 on this effort, much of which came from individual donors.

OGT's international center in Norfolk has already started rotating their 5,300 water tankers into the area to furnish water for showers and flushing toilets. They are also providing a field kitchen and vol-

unteer housing. You can read about those efforts on OGT.org.

Our warehouse is bursting with both donations and packed boxes. We are arranging a shipment currently; but, due to the recent dock strike, the exact timing is unknown. Some of you really enjoy helping pack over a thousand boxes into a container, so we will be sure to let you know when the opportunity comes up. (Others of you just like the donuts.)

We also want to report that we raised almost \$2,000 in donations during our annual Boscov's Friends Helping Friends Day. Thank you for your support!

Our next fund raiser will be our annual grant matching event which will run from mid-November to mid-December. Last year the base grant was \$13,500. This year we are hoping the base grant will reach \$15,000. It is important because this is how we finance shipping those containers and the other good works the Lord puts before us.

**LIFE** — During November we will be collecting canned and boxed food to be distributed by Lutheran Community Services to those in need this holiday season.


### AIN'T THAT THE TRUTH


Have you ever gone church shopping? Maybe you moved to a new area or became displeased with your current church. What

sort of things were you looking for in a new congregation? Did it need to be friendly without smothering you? Did the building need to be clean and updated without seeming cold and impersonal? Or maybe you were more interested in the vigor and demeanor of the minister? What message was key in the sermon? Was it uplifting enough or too condemning? Which of the following sermon themes would you prefer?

- Preach on wine and strong drink (Micah 2:11);
- Preach not to walk haughtily for it will be a time of disaster (Micah 2:3); or
- A sermon that resisted the preaching about any disgrace (Micah 2:6).



We also do not like to hear hard things. As a teacher, I never liked to make those phone calls with bad news, either. I dreaded having to say, "Your child has a failing grade or poor behavior in class." Even if the parent sympathized, they did not want to hear the disappointing news. Certain movie lines run through our minds:
